

Da Nang (Hue), Vietnam Sunday March 20 8am-11pm 83 high/71 low .07" rain 85% humidity

The port of Tien Sa, Da Nang, Vietnam. Most cruise ships dock here. The bus ride to Da Nang takes around 30 minutes. Taxis are available at the port entrance which is ~ 500 meters from the pier—prepare to haggle.





The dock area is industrial. Plans are underway to change this, as the cruise market is growing fast.

General Info

- Official currency the dong, but many places may take USD—ask first
- 100,000 dong = \$4.34
- Under Vietnamese law, ATM may only dispense cash in Vietnamese Dong. Current amounts that can be withdrawn at any one time is usually very low, 2,000,000 Dong with an additional usage charge variable from 30.000d up
- Cash rules in **Vietnam**, though **credit cards** are **accepted** in many restaurants, hotels, and shops in **Vietnam's** big cities
- **Tipping** is not customary in **Vietnam** though it is highly appreciated. ... In fact, **tipping** is not a habit of the citizens, unless **you** go to spas for a massage or upscale restaurants
- You can try out your negotiation skills in markets, independent shops and even beauty and massage salons.
 You can either ask for a "better price" or tell them what you're willing to pay. If they let you walk out of their shop without discounting the price further, you know you've gone too low. In restaurants and bars, prices are fixed
- A normal working day in Vietnam starts from 7am to 8.30am and finish between 4pm to 6pm, from Monday
 to Friday and until noon on Saturday, leave the afternoon (most) and Sunday off. Lunch is taken very
 seriously and virtually. Everything shuts down between noon and 1.30pm

General Info

- US will need a visa, but ship likely will provide them for you
- Vietnam is a friendly and safe place to travel
- Internet and wi-fi are widely available. Wi-fi is almost always free of charge. Many cafes and restaurants also have (free) wi-fi. Connection speeds are normally good. Internet cafes are also available, costing 3000d to 8000d per hour. Most travellers also surf the net using 3G or 4G mobile phone connections. Best sims: Viettel, Vinaphon, MobiFone. Temples and mosques: women bring a shawl and both men and women should wear long pants
- Trafffic will be hectic and honking is common
- Avoid tap water
- In tourist centers many Vietnamese will speak some **English**. However, English is becoming more popular as a second language. English study is obligatory in most schools.

Overview

Da Nang is Vietnam's third largest city (1,125,000 people). It was originally known as Cho Han (the Market of the Han), later to be renamed Tourane by the French. It has unique attractions, spectacular scenery and the friendliness of the local population. Despite of its war-torn history, Da Nang is one of the most progressive cities in Vietnam, taking advantage of the new free-market principle. Da Nang, however, may be most familiar to Americans who watched the movie Good Morning Vietnam and the popular television series China Beach.

Hoi An, once known as Faifo, was a major international port in the 16th and 17th centuries, and the foreign influences are discernible to this day. The heart of the city is still the Old Town, full of winding lanes and Chinese-styled shop houses, which is particularly atmospheric in the evening as the sun goes down. While almost all shops now cater to the tourist trade, the area has been largely preserved as is, which is unusual in Vietnam, and renovation has proceeded slowly and carefully - it's mercifully absent of towering concrete blocks and karaoke parlors. The Old Town of Hoi An is listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Hue, whose economy is primarily built around tourism, as it contains one of the few UNESCO designated sites in Vietnam, the <u>Complex of Hué Monuments</u> being a tourist attraction, alongside its moat and thick stone walls. The complex encompasses the Imperial City, with palaces and shrines; the Forbidden Purple City, once the emperor's home; and a replica of the Royal Theater.



Da Nang

Cham Museum, housing close to 300 7th-15th century sculptures of the Cham people.

Golden Bridge is a 490 ft pedestrian bridge in the <u>Bà Nà Hills</u> resort, designed to connect the <u>cable</u> <u>car</u> station with the gardens.

Marble Mountains is a cluster of five marble and limestone hills located in Ngũ Hành Sơn District, south of Da Nang city in Vietnam. The five mountains are named after the five elements of feng shui: Kim, Thuy, Moc, Hoa and Tho. are known for their Buddhist pagodas and shrines which are dedicated to various local gods.

The **Da Nang Cathedral** is one of the most famous catholic churches in Vietnam thanks to its amazing design features. The cathedral has a signature pink edifice as well as colorful stained-glass windows and a large bell tower which has an iconic weathervane at the top in the shape of a rooster. The cathedral dates from 1923 and it also goes by its local nickname which is Con Ga or Rooster Church.

Da Nang

Monkey mountain - home of a rare species of monkey called the red face monkey and the Linh Ung Pagoda, known for having the tallest statues of the Goddess of Mercy in the region which was built on top of a platform in the shape of a blooming lotus. You will also find some 21 statues of the Buddha here which are in turn located inside a larger 67 meter tall Buddha figure.

My Son is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and is made up of a collection of ruins which would have formed the base of the fearsome Champa Kingdom. The architecture here spans eight centuries and you will see ornate carvings as well as impressive stone pillars and buildings.

The **Cao Dai Temple** in Da Nang is the largest of its kind in Vietnam and is said to have some 50,000 worshippers. Here you will find a sign that says that 'All Religions Have the Same Reason' and you will find references to important figures from the main five world religions. These include statues of Jesus, Mohammed, Laotse, Buddha and Confucius and there is also a huge altar which is fitted with a large globe known as the Divine Eye.

Dragon Bridge - every Saturday and Sunday at 9 pm you can walk down to the waterfront and watch a show which lights up the bridge and the dragon even spits out fire and water from its mouth.





Hoi An

Hoi An is known across Vietnam for being a hub for beautiful locally made products and you will be able to shop for these in places like the main central market. There are also a number of handicraft villages dotted on the outskirts of the town and you can usually take a tour to these. The **Hoi An Silk Village** with homes built in the traditional style and filled with artisans who will teach you how to make beautiful silk pieces and you can even feed the silkworms here and help to unravel their cocoons.

Hoi An is known for having a number of **cooking schools** where you can get stuck in and learn all about how to make some local dishes. One of the more famous schools is the Gioan Restaurant and Cooking School and you can choose between either ordering something to eat here in the restaurant or you can sign up for a class.

One of the most opulent buildings in all of Hoi An is the **Fujian Assembly Hall** which dates from the 17th century. The main hall here is covered in carved figures that feature around a gateway which is etched with carvings of mythical Chinese creatures and 12 Midwives which are carved fertility statues that stand in the grounds of the hall.

Tombs of the Ancient Emperors date from the 19th and 20th centuries and are carved to tell the stories of Buddhist legends. Some of the main tombs not to miss include the Tomb of Tu Duc, the Tomb of Minh Mang and the Tomb of Khai Dinh.

Tu Hieu Pagoda is one of the most famous in all of Hue and dates from 1843. This pagoda was also the home of eunuchs during the times of the Ancient Citadel in Hue and nowadays some 70 monks live here.

The **Huyen Tan Princess Templ**e consists of a large complex which is covered with lakes of lotus flowers. The monastery of Emperor Tran Nhan Tong is also located here and you will also be able to stroll in picturesque orchard gardens when you visit.

The **Imperial Citadel** in Hue would have been the previous center of the government and is made up of a vast complex. When you walk around you can admire the moats, carved gates and royal pavilions, and there are also a clutch of engaging museums on the grounds. If you like Vietnamese costumes, textiles and art then make sure not to skip the main galleries here.


Thanh Toan Bridge is the most famous bridge in Hue and is said to date back some 200 years and is made up of a wooden platform which is topped with a tiled roof.

The Tiger Fighting Arena built during the time of the Minh Mang Dynasty and would have been the venue for dramatic fights between tigers and elephants; a Royal Antiquities Museum, Huda Brewery Tour; Thien Mu Pagoda; Royal Theater.



Taxi tips

Throughout Vietnam, there are really only two reputable cab companies: Mai Linh and Vinasun. If you're stuck with some second rate company, you need to ensure the meter is running, as less than honest cabbies often have a hard time remembering to click the button. A ride should generally set you back about 15,000 VND (about 65 cents in USD) per kilometer.

Never beckon someone with one finger as you would in the States. Instead, you should use your whole hand. To motion for someone, point your arm out, and lay your hand flat with your palm down. Bend your fingers toward you as if you're trying to grab something without using your thumb. Getting a cab should be quite similar; just raise your arm, flatten your hand, and bend your fingers toward you. If you just hold your arm up and out, that should work too.

Shopping – haggling at markets is expected



Con Market may not be a promising name for a shopping area but you will find some 2,000 shops here which sell everything you could ever need in **Da Nang.** These include clothes and footwear as well as local handicrafts, so this is a great place to pick up some gifts or souvenirs. This shopping area has been here since the 1940s and it was renovated in 1984 to its present form.



Lying along the lush banks of the Thu Bon River is the Hoi An **Central Market** which is the best place to shop for handicrafts while you are in **Hoi An**. You will find a huge mixture of products here including silk pieces and other textiles as well as local foodstuffs and aromatic spices.



The **Hope Center** is a project that has been set up to help disabled and disadvantaged residents in **Hue** find employment. The center makes a number of garments and you will find amazing local handicraft items.

What to Eat

Dishes you need to try in Vietnam 🍜

- *Pho:* the national Vietnamese dish. A hearty noodle & meat soup with fresh herbs eaten primarily at breakfast.
- **Sun cha:** grilled pork and noodles.
- *Goi cuốn:* my personal favorite. Fresh spring rolls filled with noodles, meat/prawns/crab and greens.
