Which Shore Excursions Are Right for You?

Choose the tours that interest you by using the icons as a general guide to the level of activity involved, and select the tours best suited to your physical capabilities. These icons will help you to interpret this brochure.



Easy Activity: Very light activity including short distances to walk; may include some steps.



Moderate Activity: Requires intermittent effort throughout, including walking medium distances over uneven surfaces and/or steps.



Strenuous Activity: Requires active participation, walking long distances over uneven and steep terrain or on steps. In certain instances, paddling or other non-walking activity is required and guests must be able to participate without discomfort or difficulty breathing.



Panoramic Tours: Specially designed for guests who enjoy a slower pace, these tourss offer sightseeing mainly from the transportation vehicle, with few or no stops, and no mandatory disembarkation from the vehicle during the tour. As vehicles outside the United States are rarely lift-equipped and ramps are seldom available, a very small amount of walking will be necessary. The pace is gentle and taking your time is encouraged.



Limited Capacity: The number of people able to participate in this tour is strictly limited. Reasons for limiting capacity may include the number of transportation seats available, or the need to maintain a safe ratio of guides for hikes, fishing and water activities. Tours require a minimum number of participants in order to operate.



Snack: This tour includes a small snack or tasting of local specialties. It is not a meal.



Meal: This tour includes a meal—lunch on daytime tours, dinner on evening tours.

Touring in Alaska

The Weather

Alaska is well known for its "liquid sunshine," changing weather and cooler temperatures, so be prepared! The best plan is not to let the weather determine the kind of time you have, but to dress in layers—a shirt, sweater and light raincoat will do—so that you can add or remove layers as needed. Shore excursions operate in all weather conditions. Cancellations due to weather are at the determination of the tour operator only. No exceptions!

Hiking

Whether you're hiking forest paths and mountain trails, or exploring rain forests and tide pools, it is absolutely necessary to wear comfortable hiking boots or athletic shoes.

Fishing

While a catch is not guaranteed, if you are going fishing, you may want to plan what to do once you've reeled in your fish. If your tour is not designated "catch-and-release," review the processing options with your boat captain or guide and have the fish forwarded to your home. Your catch will not be allowed on board the ship.

Wildlife

Although Alaska's wildlife is abundant, wildlife sightings are not guaranteed on any shore excursion advertised in this brochure unless indicated otherwise. We are confident that each independent tour operator will make every effort to accommodate the safe viewing of wildlife whenever possible.

Waivers

Signing a waiver release form provided by the local tour operator may be required for participation in certain tours.



About Flightseeing

If you do nothing else when you're ashore in Alaska, take at least one flightseeing tour. These tours tend to be some of the more expensive offerings, but the perspective gained from aloft is absolutely priceless—an experience so markedly different from any on land or sea, there is simply no comparison. Discover glaciers that tumble from heaven to earth, ice fields that stretch to eternity, and, unforgiving peaks that reach for the stratosphere, and forever change how you think about Alaska and the sheer magnitude of nature exhibited here.

If you've ever thought that all tours necessarily involve a motorcoach and a museum, it's time to broaden your horizons. Whether you merely set foot on a glacier's surface or whether you strap on a set of crampons, grab an ice-axe and step out onto a river of ice that has outlived dinosaurs and constellations, flightseeing means that you're headed for the real Alaska. Make sure you see it! Within this brochure you will find three different types of flightseeing options -- helicopter, fixed-wing and floatplane:

Helicopter Flightseeing

These tours are for more active flightseers, with the opportunity to step out onto a glacier, ride a dog-sled across the surface of the Icefield, or go ice-trekking with full gear and an expert guide.

Fixed-Wing Flightseeing

This term refers to a small plane with wheels or skis (not floats), that is often used for glacier flightseeing.

Floatplane Flightseeing

One of the most important forms of transportation in Alaska is the floatplane—versatile, practical, ubiquitous. Most commonly used for bear-watching and fishing adventures, floatplanes are able to pull up to remote beaches, bringing you to the heart of the wilderness within minutes of leaving the ship.

Weight Regulations

Please note that on all helicopter flightseeing tours, guests weighing 250 lbs or more will pay an additional surcharge over the published fare. Every guest may be weighed during the check-in process. The tour operator will endeavor to be discreet during this process, but please be aware that individual circumstances may not allow for complete privacy. For security reasons, carryon bags may not be permitted in the aircraft. Secure areas will be provided to store your items for the duration of the tour.



Frequently Asked Questions

What should I wear?

Comfortable walking shoes are recommended for all shore excursions. When you visit places of worship, we recommend dressing conservatively (no shorts or sleeveless tops), but casual clothing is perfectly acceptable. Dress in layers and have a jacket along. Bring an umbrella or raincoat, a hat and sunscreen.

What about meals?

Most tour departures complement the ship's meal service hours. In-room dining is available on board.

How will I know what time each tour departs?

The on-board Shore Excurions Order Form in your stateroom will show departure times. This information will also be printed on your shore excursions tickets, which you will receive on board. Approximate tour departure times are posted on our website at hollandamerica.com.

I am traveling with friends. Can we be accommodated on the same motorcoach?

The departure location for each tour is printed on your shore excursions tickets. If you wish to travel with friends, please arrive at the designated meeting place together. This will enable the staff to allocate space for you on the same vehicle.

Tour durations

The individual tour descriptions include approximate durations. To allow our Shore Excursions Managers flexibility to coordinate your time in port with meals and activities on the ship, exact departure times are published in the Shore Excursions Order Form on board. Using A Wheelchair or Mobility Aid Device

I have a disability. How do I know which tours will best suit me?

The tours are graded according to the relative level of activity they entail. The activity icons that appear at the beginning of each tour description provide a general idea of the level of activity. Please see page 1 for specific information or speak to a Shore Excursions specialist (1.888.425.9376).

Will I encounter difficulties (dis)embarking the ship when it's in port?

Please see the on-board Shore Excursions staff to help determine whether you can expect to encounter difficulties (dis)embarking the ship in a particular port of call. The decision whether or not to carry or provide other mobility assistance to a guest and their device (wheelchair, walker, etc.) up or down a ship's gangway, or on or off a tender boat, is at the sole discretion of the Captain, made based on his evaluation of guest and crew safety. We encourage you to bring a collapsible wheelchair as space limitations may restrict the ability of some tour operators to accommodate motorized mobility aid devices.

Ketchikan, Alaska, US - Tuesday, June 11, 2024: Built out over the water and climbing weathered stairways, Ketchikan clings to the shores of Tongass Narrows and drapes the mountains with a cheerful air. Besides the main attractions - Creek Street, the Tongass Historical Museum, Totem Bight State Park and Saxman Village, try a flightseeing trip to breathtaking Misty Fjords National Monument—a transformational adventure not to be missed. These deep water fjords left by retreating glaciers left granite cliffs towering thousands of feet above the sea and countless waterfalls cascading into placid waters. The souvenir photos you'll take from the pontoons of the plane are worth the trip alone.

Adventure Kart Expedition



Departs: 8:30 AM, 10:15 AM Approximately 3¼ Hours Adult \$299.95; Child \$199.95

Sit back, strap yourself in, and hit the accelerator for the adventure of a lifetime. Mountain trails through a harvested timber area offer the perfect venue for an **off-road challenge**.

Learn about the history, culture and economy of Ketchikan as you are transported first by motorcoach to the rain forest wilderness and the **Adventure Kart** base camp. Listen to a safety briefing and gear up in preparation for your exciting, one-and-a-half-hour guided trek.

The caravan of karts sets off to explore the remote backcountry along several miles of improved forest trail with your guide in the lead ATV. Feel the adrenaline rush at the start of your journey in a Polaris RZR 1000 that tests your ability to traverse the wilderness. A comfortable pace is maintained as you thread your way around steep curves. The road climbs to reveal unparalleled views of the Tongass National Forest, Behm Canal and Alaska's fabled Inside Passage.

Drivers and passengers have the opportunity

to switch positions for the return trip. Watch for wildlife along the way -- eagles, deer or bears are frequently sighted.

Shopping opportunities await you in the General Store before the scenic drive back to the ship.

Notes:

Minimum height is 57 inches. Minimum weight is 40 lbs; maximum weight is 300 lbs. Minimum age to drive is 18 years with a valid driver's license. Bring your driver's license. Drivers must present a credit card for damage deposit. Two people per kart. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. The weather affects tour conditions; your drive may be muddy or dusty. Waiver must be signed.

Alaska Fishing & Wilderness Dining



Departs: 8:30 AM Approximately 5-54 Hours Price \$399.95

Perfect for serious fisher-people and for families seeking a personalized tour, this tour is customized for your interest and **fishing** skill level with just six guests per boat. The light tackle used ensures that even averagesized fish are exciting and rewarding to bring aboard.

At the marina, you're outfitted head to toe. Board an **open-air skiff** and glide into a breathtaking landscape of secluded locations, ideal for wildlife viewing and remote fishing. With your custom light tackle, you'll experience the thrill of **angling** for numerous bottom fish species and whichever of the five Pacific salmon species are in season. You'll work as a group to bring fish aboard and provide for the gourmet wilderness meal you're about to enjoy. Salmon, halibut, Dungeness crab, kelp greenling, pelagic rockfish and at least fifty other species are potentially on the menu.

At a wilderness campsite, a **crackling fire** awaits. You'll settle into the stillness of the rain forest, rest on a beach log, and breathe deeply among centuries-old spruce trees and fragrant cedars. A **wilderness dining** chef celebrates the group's catch with a meal featuring the fish you just caught. Depending on your catch, you might dine on bottom fish served atop a saffron-infused bouillabaisse or salmon grilled over the fire in true Alaska fashion. Enjoy fire-warmed sourdough rolls, rhubarb-blueberry bread pudding and a steaming mug of coffee or hot chocolate. Whichever of the fifty species you keep for

lunch, your five-star gourmet meal is a oncein-a-lifetime experience.

Your tour concludes with a short **walk** back to the ship and fish tales to share with friends old and new.

Notes:

Maximum capacity is six guests. Participants must be physically active, as this tour requires negotiating uneven terrain, and the skiff is open to the elements. Dress warmly in layers with a wind- and waterproof outer layer; bring gloves, a scarf and a warm hat. Rain gear, rubber boots, comfortable float jackets, wool socks, hats, gloves, fishing equipment and tackle are provided. Minimum age is 5 years. Maximum weight is 350 lbs. Not advisable for guests using a wheelchair. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. A catch is likely but is not guaranteed. The Alaska Department of Fish & Game implements conservation measures to protect king salmon; restrictions on keeping your catch may apply. Please check directly with the Alaska Department of Fish & Game for restrictions specific to your tour date. All participants aged 16 and older must purchase a fishing license in advance by following these steps:

Authentic Alaska Bottom-Fishing

Departs: 8:30 AM Approximately 5-51/4 Hours Price \$479.95

Anyone can put a line in the water, but it takes skill to catch the variety of fish species that Alaska's waters offer. You'll spend the day on a state-of-the-art **fishing vessel** with a seasoned guide who will bring you to the bottom-fishing grounds Alaskans have been returning to for generations.

No matter your skill level, you will **fish like a local**, working the sandy flats or sea floor pinnacles with your rod in hand, drifting with

the current and jigging in waters as deep as 300 feet. Species availability changes throughout the season, and daily factors such as tides and wind affect your fishing opportunities. This multi-species Alaskan bottom-fishing expedition allows you to head out with the confidence that you will catch fish. Down there, in the twilight of the deep, rockfish, cod, flounder, sharks, skates and mighty halibut find their way to your bait. No matter what the conditions or the catch, this trip offers the best chance of exposing you to the strange and alien species found on the Southeast Alaskan deep-sea floor.

Catch a fish? Now enjoy every bite, perfectly prepared by an expert chef and served on board the ship. The **Savor My Catch** program is a true ocean-to-fork experience and is available with this fishing adventure.

Notes:

Historically, 50% of participants catch halibut. Minimum age is 5 years. Minimum weight is 30 lbs; maximum weight is 300 lbs. Deck or rubber-soled shoes must be worn on board. Dress warmly in layers with a windand waterproof outer layer; bring gloves, a scarf and a warm hat. Rain gear, rubber boots, comfortable float jackets, wool socks, hat and gloves are provided, as well as all fishing equipment and tackle. A boxed snack includes smoked salmon dip, crackers, fruit, and a cookie. Guests who choose to have their fish processed and sent home (to US only) will need to bring their credit card to pay for processing. A catch is likely but is not guaranteed. The Alaska Department of Fish & Game implements conservation measures to

protect halibut; restrictions on keeping your catch may apply. Please check directly with the Alaska Department of Fish & Game for restrictions specific to your tour date. Only fish species that do not have restrictions in place can be shipped home or delivered to the ship for Savor My Catch. All participants aged 16 and older must purchase a fishing license in advance by following these steps:

Backcountry Jeep & Canoe Safari

Departs: 11:30 AM Approximately 4 Hours Adult \$244.95; Child \$174.95

Fill your senses with adventure and excitement as you take control of a **4-wheel-drive Jeep® Wrangler®** and wind your way through the rugged back roads of Revillagigedo Island. You'll be paired up with traveling companions in groups of four and begin the adventure into the mountainous roads of the **Tongass National Forest**.

The route takes you through lush rain forest and up mountain roads to view magnificent scenery. Using a two-way radio, your group leader and guide will provide you with interesting and informative commentary along the way. You'll also interact with the guide and other jeeps with your radio. You'll be fascinated by the area's natural history as you pass through old-growth and secondary-growth forests. Learn about the timber industry's reforestation methods while stopping for fantastic views and photo opportunities. Along the route, there will be an opportunity to change drivers.

The Jeep portion of your tour concludes with your arrival at **Lake Harriet Hunt**. Grab a paddle and join your companions in a 37-foot, 20-passenger **Native-style canoe** to navigate your way across this mountain lake and experience the unique ecosystem from a fun vantage point. These canoes are easy to paddle, stable and fast.

On the far side of the lake, enjoy a **snack**.

Your expert safari guide will lead you on a nature walk through old-growth forest, where you will learn about the different aspects of the temperate rain forest surrounding you. This nature walk is optional. If you choose not to go, you're welcome to stay in the gazebo.

After paddling back across the lake, reboard your motorcoach for the scenic drive back to Ketchikan.

Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. Waiver must be signed.
Participants must be moderately fit.
Minimum age is 5 years. Minimum age to drive is 25 years. Bring your driver's license.

Bering Sea Crab Fishermen



Departs: 11:00 AM (Waitlisted) Approximately 3¼ Hours Adult \$219.95; Child \$169.95

Wildlife is everywhere in Alaska -- crabs, eagles, whales, octopus, sea lions, porpoise, wolf eels, sharks and seals are all frequently spotted on the **Bering Sea Crab Fishermen** tour. Come aboard the *Aleutian Ballad* for the adventure of a lifetime. The *Aleutian Ballad* was made famous in season two of

Discovery Channel's award-winning TV series *Deadliest Catch* , but there are no rough seas here.

You will set out in the calm, protected waters of Alaska's **Inside Passage** to witness firsthand the challenges commercial fishermen face. Marvel at the scenic beauty surrounding you from the comfort of the heated and sheltered stadium-style seating lower deck or the openair top deck.

Watch as the skilled crew haul and set long lines, barrel pots and huge 700-pound king crab pots to reveal the day's catch. The fascinating marine life is placed in an on-deck aquarium so everyone can get up close with these creatures. This engaging, educational and interactive experience is perfect for all ages. It is packed with stories and adventures shared by the men and women who risk their lives fishing the Bering Sea.

Notes:

Suitable for guests using a wheelchair. This tour does NOT go out into the rough waters of the open ocean; it remains in the calm, protected waterways of the Inside Passage surrounding Ketchikan. Dress warmly in layers with a wind- and waterproof outer layer; bring gloves, a scarf and a warm hat. Raincoats are provided if needed. Minimum age is 5 years.

Best of Ketchikan: Totems, Wildlife Cruise & Alaska Appetizers



Departs: 11:15 AM Approximately 3¾ Hours Adult \$219.95; Child \$189.95

Enjoy three tours in one -- explore Saxman Native Village, view the region's famous wildlife by boat, and savor Alaska cuisine at a historic cannery. It's the best of Ketchikan by land and sea.

Depart the dock by motorcoach and enjoy a narrated drive through downtown Ketchikan with views of historic Creek Street -- a row of colorful shops in what was once the red-light district.

Arriving at **Saxman Native Village**, walk amongst the world's most extensive collection of totems, observe a Tlingit totem carver at work, and visit the village gift shop.

Continuing along the scenic coastal highway, leave the coach and set off along a shoreline rain forest trail to the historic George Inlet Cannery. Enjoy a self-paced exploration of this once-bustling maritime center featuring restored and fully operational canning machinery. Tour an interactive exhibition that takes you inside the commercial fishing industry as you enjoy a delicious sampling of Alaska appetizers with a glass of beer or wine.

Finally, board a spacious, comfortable excursion **boat** to explore the rugged coastline of the **Tongass Narrows** and glacier-carved

George Inlet. Visit **Walden Rocks** -- a seal haul-out and gathering place for bald eagles and marine birds. Whales, sea lions and porpoises are frequently sighted here.

Notes:

Dress warmly in layers with a wind- and waterproof outer layer; bring gloves, a scarf and a warm hat. Wear comfortable walking shoes. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. Participants must be able to (dis)embark the transportation at multiple venues. Walking is required on a variety of uneven terrain, boardwalks, ramps, gravel paths and grass. Tour operates rain or shine but may be canceled by the operator in the event of extremely bad weather or unsuitable conditions.

City Highlights, Totems & Creek Street by Trolley

Learn the history and culture of **Ketchikan** as you travel aboard a **festive trolley**. You will be entertained by a lively guide while passing by some of the city's most colorful landmarks.

Travel through downtown Ketchikan and pass the bustling boat harbor, lush City Park and beautiful Ketchikan Creek. Next, you can stretch your legs on a brief photo and shopping stop.

Photograph majestic **totems** up close, and shop at one of Ketchikan's finest stores to purchase authentic Native-made items and

curios.

Finally, you're off to **Creek Street** -Ketchikan's historic red-light district. You
will have **free time** to explore Creek Street on
your own. Your trolley driver will offer you a
return ride to the ship, or you can enjoy the
downtown area's many shops and eateries and
make your own way back.

Not advisable for guests using a wheelchair.

Crab Expedition Wildlife Cruise & King Crab Snack

Departs: 11:00 AM (Waitlisted) Approximately 3¼ Hours Adult \$259.95; Child \$209.95

Embark on a calm, scenic cruise through a passage to the waters of **Annette Bay** -- home to the Tsimshian Native Americans. The maritime predators of Alaska also live along this rocky shoreline -- seals swim about, and North American bald eagles dive-bomb the boat to catch fish.


Watch as one of the crew demonstrates the oldest techniques of catching fish. Crabs, prawns, starfish, sea urchins and octopus are brought on board and placed in the live tank for you to view fresh from their natural habitat. **Touch and learn about the vast sea life** in this North Pacific ecosystem.

As you head back to port, enjoy a **half-pound portion of the finest king crab**, served picnic style, and listen to the stories of people who spend their lives on Alaska waters.

Notes:

Suitable for guests using a wheelchair. Waterproof jackets and rain ponchos are provided. Bring your own rain gear if you prefer. Wear closed-toe shoes. Dress warmly in layers with a wind- and waterproof outer layer; bring gloves, a scarf and a warm hat. Bring gloves, a warm hat and a scarf. Wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. Minimum age is 5 years.

Eagle Islands Sea Kayak



Your paddle in the **Tongass National Forest** begins with a 25-minute ride to a private kayak center on a quiet waterway at Clover Pass.

Meet your **tandem kayak** and listen to a safety briefing from your guide. Gain confidence as you paddle out to **Eagle Islands**. The protected waters provide the opportunity to experience the tranquil, lush green setting of the Tongass National Forest.

You will learn about the natural and cultural history of the area while keeping a keen eye out for bald eagles and their nests, seals, jumping salmon and sea stars when the tide conditions are right.

Notes:

Minimum age is 6 years; maximum age is 85 years. Maximum weight is 265 lbs. Maximum

height is 6' 7". Approximately 1.75 hours of paddling. Single and triple kayaks are available. Dress warmly in layers. Wear a hat or beanie; bring gloves and a scarf.

Exclusive Coastal Cruise & Oyster Farm with Ocean-to-Table Tasting



Departs: 11:00 AM, 1:00 PM Approximately 31/4 Hours Price \$189.95

Set out on this **small-group eco-tour** with a maximum of 14 privileged guests.

You're headed to the scenic **Tongass Narrows** -- one of the most picturesque locations in Alaska. Hump Island -- the only oyster farm in the state -- is located here. Your visit will tantalize your taste buds and showcase the natural wonders of the Alaska Archipelago. You do not need to be a fan of oysters to have a great time on this tour.

The **oyster farm team** provides an engaging introduction to the facility, the oyster-growing process, and the cultivation of the shellfish from the width of a thumbnail to market size.

Get better acquainted with the thriving,

prickly, smooth, slippery and slimy endemic marine wildlife of the clear and clean Southeast Alaska waters through the educational **hands-on touch tank**. Hear stories of life in a small Alaskan community. Footage from an underwater drone gives you a feel for the ecosystem surrounding the oyster rafts and the oysters' food sources.

Lead with your taste buds at the on-site **floating Oyster Bar**, where you will sample freshly-harvested oyster and kelp products in a true ocean-to-table experience.

Browse in the **gift shop** before returning to the ship by boat and van.

nature **walk**, highlighting the flora and fauna of the rain forest, including a carnivorous plant -- the sundew -- which uses tentacles with an adhesive 'dew' to ensnare small insects. If you choose not to go on the walk, the cook will keep you company at the remote shoreside camp.

Don't miss this rare opportunity to comfortably explore Southeast Alaska in the same way it was discovered by its original explorers and inhabitants.

This is country rich with wildlife, and along the way, you might observe whales, Steller sea lions, harbor seals, bald eagles and migrating seabirds.

Landing on a beautiful, secluded beach, follow your guide **on foot** through the ancient

Tongass National Forest -- the nation's largest National Forest with almost 17 million acres, of which approximately 5.7 million acres have been designated wilderness. It is home to many animals, including bears, eagles, salmon, sandhill cranes, wolves and trumpeter swans. You will learn about the many botanical species native to this region.

The trail you will take is mostly boardwalk, well-maintained, and about one mile long. Your guide will point out the great western red cedars and yellow cedars that early Natives depended on for spiritual enrichment, shelter and transportation. Hear about the beach life here -- perhaps sea stars or sea cucumber, or learn how the Natives used seaweed in their daily lives.

During your stay on the island, you'll enjoy a snack around the campfire and take in the beautiful vistas before returning to Ketchikan.

This eco-exploration includes a **guided nature hike**, bald eagles, an on-site totem park and a historic sawmill at an exclusive reserve in the forested mountains at rustic Herring Cove. A pristine natural environment, it is home to bald eagles, black bears, seals and a variety of birds and other species attracted by the major salmon runs in the abundant marine estuary.

A naturalist will guide you along an **improved trail** through the heart of the dense forest, among tall stands of hemlock, spruce and cedar, stopping at strategically located viewing areas. At a protected, open estuary, you'll follow Eagle Creek along an elevated wooden boardwalk overlooking grassy wetlands. Major runs of salmon return to spawn here. Listen to the symphony of bird activity in this spectacular setting. Seasonal ecosystem changes result in varying levels of wildlife activity.

A .75-mile **trail walk** brings you to the historic Herring Bay Lumber Company sawmill.

Spend time in the carving center learning about Native culture and traditions before heading outside to view the amazing collection of **Tsimshian totems**. **Shopping** opportunities await you in the General Store before the scenic drive back to the ship.

Rain Forest Trail E-Bike & Nature Walk

Join an experienced Alaskan trail guide for an electric **mountain bike ride** through the unspoiled beauty of Ketchikan's coastal rainforest. The gently sloping historical trail weaves through the **Tongass National Forest** under cover of towering old-growth spruce and hemlock.

The throttle/pedal-assisted electric bike makes easy work of the three-mile-long trail that follows the historic wooden pipeline to the Connell Lake Dam, making the trip accessible for riders of all abilities and skill levels.

Gather by the warm campfire at a rustic creek-side camp to hear stories and enjoy an Alaskan-style snack of s'mores and hot beverages.

A guided **nature walk** highlights the flora and fauna of Southeast Alaska, including a carnivorous plant called the sundew, which uses tentacles with an adhesive 'dew' to

ensnare small insects.

Saddle up for the ride along the Connell Lake Pipeline Trail to return your bike. Conclude with the scenic drive back to the pier, narrated by your guide.

Rain Forest Zip-Line, Skybridge & Rappel Adventure

Live the thrill of gliding through the top of a rich rain forest canopy along a series of eight zip-lines with three aerial bridges suspended between tall spruce, hemlock and cedar trees bordering the magnificent Tongass National Forest. This major rain forest reserve embraces one of Alaska's richest salmon spawning streams and a pristine intertidal estuary. The abundant wildlife habitat here includes a high concentration of bald eagles, black bear, and a variety of other species.

At Herring Cove, an all-terrain custom 4x4

Unimog will transport you up a steep rain forest hillside to the canopy chalet. Professionally trained guides will outfit you with state-of-the-art safety equipment and provide a detailed orientation before you mount the first platform.

Your rain forest canopy challenge features a 'flight' over eight **zip-lines**. Your guide will progressively ease you into the forest canopy along cables ranging from 100 feet to the 750foot, pulse-pounding Ben's Revenge. Eagles and bears are often seen from the platforms. Cross three hanging bridges offering breathtaking views of the virgin forest below. You will be up to 135 feet above the forest floor. Throughout this adventure, you are surrounded by the sights and sounds of the rain forest wildlife preserve. The final zip-line emerges from the rain forest and transports you over lush grassy wetlands to a viewing tower 55 feet above. From here, you will rappel to the ground.

Time permitting, explore the totem park and a historic sawmill, and watch a blacksmith at work. Stop by the General Store to see photos taken during your zip-line experience and to shop for mementos of your Alaska adventure.

Your excursion concludes with a scenic drive back to the ship.

Tatoosh Islands Sea Kayaking

Join this memorable trip into the **Tongass Rain Forest** to the Tatoosh Islands to paddle with Ketchikan's most experienced local sea kayaking company among magnificent scenery and wildlife sighting opportunities.

Take a 25-minute **van** ride; then, a fast and fun **boat ride** brings you to a world of ancient cedars, spruce and western hemlock trees.

At the remote and protected **Tatoosh Islands**, your guides greet you and present a quick but thorough orientation. Get into your double **kayak** and begin with some practice strokes as you approach the sheltered islands. Surrender to the peacefulness of the setting as you glide along the wild rocky shoreline.

Bald eagles peer down from overhead, while seals often pop up to take a peek. The intertidal zone includes mink, river otter, orange and purple starfish, red and white jellyfish, mussels and seaweeds. Further out in the floating bull kelp, watch for harbor seals, who watch back with a shy and curious

disposition. Keep an eye out for humpback whales, sea lions and orcas. Black bears and wolves have been sighted here as well.

You will explore the boundary of the Metlakatla Indian Reserve -- an area teeming with wildlife.

Plying the waters of Nichol's Passage, the captain will maneuver the boat to give the best possible views of any whales, seals,

porpoise or bald eagles sighted here.

Learn about Ketchikan's notorious rum runners and fish pirates as you pass Whiskey Cove, Alaska's busiest port, and several seaplane bases. Your cruise ship provides the best photo backdrop.

At Clover Pass, you'll meet your crew and board the **adventure boat** and head out in search of excitement.

Your first stop will be a nearby **active eagle's nest**. Learn about 'America's bird' and look for hatchlings in the nest. Your captain will navigate through bays and inlets while the narrator offers insights into the land, air and

sea. Learn about the timber industry and how it shaped the development of Alaska, and get a feeling for life on the island.

Venture past the **Back Island Naval Testing Facility** -- home to some of the most sensitive ears on the planet. Learn about their work on cruise ships and Navy vessels, including nuclear submarines. Keep your eyes open for wildlife, as porpoises and seals are frequent visitors along the tour route. During May and September, whales are often sighted inside Clover Passage.

Your final stop is at **Silverking Lodge**, in the heart of **Grant Island State Marine Park**. Walk the elevated boardwalk into the heart of the rain forest for an up-close look at the flora and fauna of Southeast Alaska, and take your picture next to the largest known red cedar in the **Tongass National Forest**.

Finish off your tour under the covered gazebo as you dine on a delectable **seafood** meal of crab, shrimp, clams, mussels, potatoes, onions, garlic, corn, and sausage -- all cooked in one delicious pot and served piping hot at your table. Top off your meal with dessert.

Use your last few minutes to take photos, grab a souvenir from the gift shop, or soak up the atmosphere around the lodge before returning to Clover Pass Resort and the ship.

You will leave downtown Ketchikan and embark on a fully narrated drive following the scenic coastline past a cannery, an old sawmill, totems and waterfalls.

At George Inlet Lodge, board a 46-foot, enclosed sightseeing vessel. On your cruise up the fjord, you will pass the old George Inlet Cannery and learn about the fish traps and 'pirates' that plagued the area years ago. View the Mahoney Glacial Cirque, with snow-capped mountains and 2,000-foot waterfalls site of an abandoned short-seam silver mine. Below the cirque, the Mahoney River Valley is home to bears, eagles, and salmon that return to spawn annually. Orca whales, sea lions, and seals frequently visit the area for an abundant food supply.

Cross the fjord to a remote crab estuary and witness the awe-inspiring grandeur of the Tongass National Forest -- the largest temperate rain forest in the world. This isolated cove is home to hundreds of Dungeness crabs. A crab pot will be pulled up for everyone to view and gain knowledge for a hands-on opportunity to see the crab up close. Learn about their anatomy and life

cycle before the crab is set free.

Once the pots are reset, it's back to the warm and inviting George Inlet Lodge, where an allyou-can-eat delicious Dungeness crab meal awaits you. Relax amid Alaskan hospitality and the rustic charm of the lodge while you learn about its origins as a cannery bunkhouse. After a quick lesson in the art of crab cracking, you will enjoy the succulent delicacy of this Alaskan favorite with a **crab feast**. Your banquet will include a beverage, fresh salad, Dungeness crab with butter, and, for dessert, cheesecake smothered in Alaska blueberries. **Notes:** Tour sequence may vary. Come hungry. Dress in comfortable, warm layers and wear shoes with good traction. The lodge is accessed by numerous stairs. A van is available to transport guests unable to navigate the steps. Vegetarian and non-crab options can be substituted.

Sitka, Alaska, US - Wednesday, June 12, 2024: The onion domes of St. Michael's Cathedral are your first clue that Sitka was once a Russian settlement – the colonial headquarters of Count Baranof, no less. Discover the echoes of its heyday at a performance by the New Archangel Dancers. Be greeted by Tlingit native people, then stand on the spot where the United States took possession of Alaska in 1867 for \$7.2 million, less than two cents per acre. The dramatic setting in the shadow of Mt. Edgecumbe is one of the lovliest in the Great Land. Take a stroll through old growth forest in Sitka National Historical Park, shop the downtown district, and poke around the Sheldon Jackson Museum for a close-up look at some of the city's most prized arts, crafts and Russian relics.

Advanced Mountain Bike

This **challenging mountain bike ride** is designed for the physically fit and experienced biker.

Participants will ride through the city of **Sitka** via a combination of mountain-bike trails and coastal roads. Your Trek bike is equipped with electrical assistance -- a wonderful way to see the beautiful environment of Southeast Alaska. Total distance cycled is approximately 16 - 22 miles.

Alaska 4x4 Nature Safari

This fun and adventuresome **nature safari** takes you to remote, volcanic **Kruzof Island**.

Head to a local jetty and board a **boat** for a fast, fun ride through numerous picturesque islands. Keep your eyes peeled for American bald eagles, sea otters and sea lions.

As you approach Kruzof Island, your captain will point out some intricate volcanic rock formations. Step ashore and meet your guide.

Get acquainted with your **Polaris Ranger vehicle** and, after a safety orientation and operating instructions, it's your turn to drive. Follow your guide on a trail through forest surrounded by beautiful scenery. Drive over bridges with gurgling streams with salmon running up them in season, and pass along a wildflower meadow on your way to a scenic estuary. Here, you will stop and search for wildlife such as Alaska coastal brown bear and Sitka black-tail deer.

After enjoying a **snack**, it's time to ride back to the jetty and take the boat back to Sitka.

Alaska Raptor Center & Rain Forest City Walk

Walk through history and nature as you discover the heart and soul of Alaska's coastal communities in this 'rain forest city'. From soaring eagles to the tiniest vole, from the first

peoples of Sitka to today's modern residents, from forest to shoreline, all elements combine here to form a unique frontier town. Discover how the first people thrived here, while successive waves of Russians and Americans were drawn to this rich confluence of land and sea to harvest its bounty and make their own mark. You can still see the spires of Russian Orthodoxy in the heart of small-town Sitka, while towering totems perch on the edge of the Pacific Ocean.

Beginning at the **Alaska Raptor Center**, learn how handlers nurse injured bald eagles back to health for release back into the wild. Enjoy up-close encounters with these majestic birds of prey.

A river runs through Sitka National Historical Park's lush rain forest, representing both the start and end of the life cycle of many species, including salmon. As you walk beneath giant spruce along totem-lined trails, learn how salmon are part of the food chain for both humans and animals, and even for the soil itself. Moving to the park's shoreline, search for wild bald eagles, ravens and other mammals. When the tide allows, explore a rich intertidal zone that abounds with life, while keeping a sharp eye out for interesting beach finds. Totems escort you to the park exit, and you'll learn how this place has been

home to Tlingit, Russian and American peoples.

Pass the Sitka Sound Science Center -- a working hatchery where the salmon journey begins for millions of fry destined for the wild. In season, you'll see salmon spawning at the end of an incredible ocean journey to their birthplace upstream.

Finally, stroll past **Crescent Harbor**, filled with thousands of commercial, sport and subsistence vessels, earning the town its "Sitka by the Sea" moniker. See the Russian Bishop's House and St Michael's Orthodox Cathedral's spires rising above the heart of the city. St Michael's is open to guests, should you choose to explore further on your own.

Notes:

The tour ends at the downtown central stoplight. Not advisable for guests using a wheelchair or for those with mobility limitations. Walking is on established gravel pathways or pavement. Participants must be able to walk up to 1.4 miles and stand for up to two hours. Fish for species in season -- steelhead, salmon, trout and char could be running. Dolly Varden are available when there are salmon in the rivers.

All wading and fishing gear, snacks, beverages, and a shoreside lunch are provided. You'll return to the ship totally hooked on remote Alaska fly fishing.

An onboard naturalist will explain the workings of this remarkable ecosystem as your skilled skipper maneuvers the vessel to provide the best possible views.

Take a short coach ride to the renowned Alaska Raptor Center, where injured birds of prey, including the American bald eagle, receive medical treatment. A wildlife interpreter will guide you through the Bald Eagle Flight Center and introduce you to some of the raptors-in-residence perched in outdoor habitats. Enjoy some free time to explore the river trail and use the interactive exhibits.

Birds, Bears & Barnacles

This is your **guaranteed** opportunity to view up close Alaska's majestic **bald eagles**, Alaska **coastal brown bears**, and ocean sea life from aquariums, touch tanks, and a salmon hatchery.

Departing the pier, you will drive to the **Alaska Raptor Center to learn** about the many birds of prey in the Flight Center and outdoor bird habitats. The Raptor Center specializes in the care of the American bald eagle.

Head along a scenic portion of the Sitka road system, stopping at the Fortress of the Bear. Learn about the life and habits of the Alaska coastal brown bear (grizzly), and an elevated platform offers views of them. You'll see their handler feed, talk to and encourage them in a natural but enclosed habitat.

The **Sitka Marine Science Center** houses an active salmon hatchery, saltwater aquariums, and live fish touch tanks displaying many of the marine species found in Sitka's ocean waters. This program is an educational experience for all ages -- a chance to appreciate some of the inhabitants of Alaska's remarkable animal kingdom.

Drv Suit Snorkel

Explore the **underwater world of Southeast Alaska** and learn about the marine biology of the ocean floor that teems with life in the waters of Sitka Sound. The advantages of using a dry suit are warmth, buoyancy, safety, comfort, and ease of changing -- you simply wear your own street clothes under the dry suit.

You will be picked up dockside for a transfer to the changing area. There is a secure place to leave your belongings. In your dry suit, you will head to **Magic Island**, located within the **Halibut Point Recreation State Park**.

Listen to a safety orientation, and your guide will answer any questions; Your guides provide information regarding the water temperatures, visibility, tidal fluctuations and local marine life. There is a 1:6 guide-to-guest ratio, and a certified dive master accompanies the group. All guides are trained in CPR, dive and snorkel procedures, and the marine environment.

Then comes the once-in-a-lifetime and highly unusual experience of **snorkeling in the** waters of Alaska. You will spend approximately 30 - 60 minutes in the water watching for sea life such as sea stars, sun stars (up to 60 lbs), crabs, a variety of fish, sea anemones (one of the oldest animals on

earth), a variety of filter feeders, sea urchins, sea cucumbers, and the colorful bio-mass of the sea floor. You can also explore the giant kelp forest near the snorkel area.

Explore an open bird habitat where eagles fly free, as well as stunning examples of Russian Colonial architecture, captivating native tales and the ancient rain forest of Alaska's oldest National Park. On this tour, Sitka's Russian, Tlingit and American culture, past and present, comes alive.

A brief **panoramic drive** through the **historic district** showcases Totem Square and Castle Hill -- site of the 1867 purchase and land transfer ceremony of Alaska from colonial Russia. You'll also pass the Alaska Pioneer Home, the Russian Bishop's house and, from a distance, see St Michael's Russian Orthodox Cathedral.

Discover the **Alaska Raptor Center**, staffed mostly by volunteers who rescue the birds, provide rehabilitative care for them, and hopefully release the birds back to the wild. After your introduction to the facility, you

will see the fascinating **bird-on-a-glove presentation**. View the clinic, outside deck habitat area, and the eagle flight center. Photograph the birds throughout the grounds.

At Sitka National Historical Park, wander through the lush forest and along a scenic beach path where totems depict the rich culture of the southeast Native people. A short optional walk includes topics such as edible and medicinal plants, the life cycle and traditional uses of various salmon species, and rain forest ecology. Don't miss the park's Visitor Center featuring local Native artists, when available, along with both ancient and modern displays, and view a fascinating audio-visual presentation on Sitka's history.

Experience authentic **Tlingit stories and songs** during a visit to a modern rendition of a traditional-style clan house built on the site of a former government school. The Naa Kahídi Community House features the largest carved house-screen in the Pacific Northwest and comes alive with songs and voices -- including your own. Admire the beautiful regalia clothing and even learn to speak a bit of Tlingit before you leave.

Your tour concludes with the transfer back to the ship, or you may choose to stay and explore downtown Sitka. Wander down the main street of this charming Alaskan town on your own, and perhaps visit **St Michael's**Cathedral -- the first Russian Orthodox cathedral in America -- to view priceless icons and religious artifacts.

Fortress of the Bear & Silver Bay Homestead Cruise

Then, take to the water aboard an **expedition vessel** to explore a **glacier-carved fjord**. Along the way, you will step ashore at a remote **Alaskan homestead** where your wilderness guides share the knowledge the original inhabitants of Southeast Alaska have used to thrive here for thousands of years. Enjoy spectacular views of the bay from the beach or while sitting around the **campfire**, complete with **s'mores and cocoa**.

Back aboard your expedition craft, you will cruise north in search of Steller sea lions and other **wildlife** species common to the area. At Sawmill Creek, you will transfer to a waiting coach to continue your exploration by road.

Notes:

Some walking is required on mostly level surfaces between modes of transportation and

Historic Sitka Highlights

Your route will take you past the Russian Bishop's house, Castle Hill, and the Russian Blockhouse.

Stop at **St Michael's Cathedral**, the Mother Cathedral of Orthodoxy for All of America, and step inside this small church to see icons and priceless religious artwork dating back to

the late 15th century. Hear the miraculous story of how this artwork was saved from the Main Street fire in 1966, which destroyed one-third of downtown Sitka.

Your final stop is at **Centennial Hall** to watch **Alaska Storytellers**, a dynamic 30-minute live performance showcasing Sitka's rich history and featuring music, dance, photos, art, and video.

This is an excellent way to discover Sitka and identify other historical attractions to visit on your own.

own uniquely perfect piece of artwork to take home and hang on the wall as a reminder of your creative, fun, and unusual Alaska vacation.

seals, sea otters, eagles and a variety of marine birds.

You're headed to beautiful and scenic Camp Coogan Bay and the Boar's Nest Floathouse. This is a privately-owned floating home built in the 1920s during the heyday of the logging industry. Your guide tells you about Camp Coogan Bay's logging history and living off the grid in this remote bay. A slice of the real Alaska!

Enjoy a **light snack and beverage** at the floathouse before you reboard the boat for the short ride back to Crescent Harbor.

Your guide is a local and loves to share what the Alaska lifestyle is really like. From dark winter days to long summer nights and living in a close-knit community, life in Alaska is truly different.

Your tour includes two local beers, but you can purchase snacks, souvenirs and up to two additional drinks.

Adventure seekers and ocean lovers will feel right at home riding a two-person

WaveRunner® personal watercraft through the unmatched beauty of Sitka Sound and its thousands of islands.

Head to a local beach and put on a dry suit and a life jacket. Listen to a safety briefing from your guide and wade out to your WaveRunner to hop on.

Time is spent maneuvering about in the protected bay until all participants are comfortable. Then, set out in a group led by a local **US Coast Guard-certified captain**. Follow your captain in caravan formation towards the protected waters of Silver Bay, skirting in and out of smaller bays, in between islands, and along the beaches of Sitka Sound. You'll stop often to talk about local marine life, flora and fauna, as well as local history and culture.

Total ride time is approximately 1.25 hours. You will return to the bay for transportation back to the pier or to Sitka's downtown area.

Guests wishing to stay in town to shop or explore independently are welcome to do so but must make their own way back to the ship.

Notes:

This trip is sold by the machine -- each WaveRunner can accommodate two guests, so book per party, not per individual, unless each person wants to drive their own machine. One person on each machine must be able to operate the machine and follow directions. The guide/captain uses arm signals to instruct participants to follow in line, slow down, shut down the machine, and spread out; participants must be able to see and follow signals. Sitka's Barrier Islands & Fin Island Lodge

Adjacent to Sitka is a **network of islands** that provide a barrier from the swell of the Pacific Ocean. Skim across the water in an **inflatable expedition boat** through the wildlife-filled archipelago.

Gear up with a waterproof outfit. After a safety briefing, your captain skillfully navigates among the offshore islands. You'll see reefs and rock pinnacles that jut out of the water to act as perches for bald eagles and beautiful seabirds. What lies beneath? Look down at the rapidly-growing kelp forests that appear from the depths of the sound. In shallow water, you may even notice sea stars and anemones.

Keep an eye out for the local wildlife,

including sea otters, whales and sea lions. Your captain is trained to approach animals in a way that will not disturb their natural behavior but can provide viewing and photo opportunities.

A gourmet meal awaits you upon arrival at Fin Island Lodge. Sit down to delicious Alaska crab and wild salmon cooked over an alder wood-fired grill. Also on the menu are prime rib, homemade side dishes and dessert. Coffee, tea, cocoa, lemonade and water are included. Alaska-brewed beers, wine and soft drinks are available for purchase.

You can relax next to the welcoming **beach fire**, explore the island or go beachcombing.

Return to Sitka by boat.

Notes:

A breakfast twist on the signature Fin Island feast is offered for tours arriving before 10 am; vegan and gluten-free options are available. Dietary requests require at least 24 hours' notice. Your adventure begins in Sitka. At Crescent Harbor, board a **boat** and depart for **Camp Coogan Bay**. Wildlife viewing during the 20-minute ride may include eagles, sea lions, sea otters, whales and a variety of sea birds. You'll be introduced to Sitka's natural, geological, and cultural history en route to your guide's **residential floating house**. This is where you will gear up for the hike.

Then, it's a short ride across the bay to begin your walk in the Tongass National Forest. The first section is uphill through old-growth trees on trails that are not groomed but have been brushed out and widened. There are some slippery and steep areas with roots and downed trees to step over and an open muskeg (boggy) area. You will reach the lake stocked with small and abundant trout (not trophy size).

Fly fishing or spin casting gear is provided for those who want to try their luck, along with bait and tackle. Inflatable **canoes** and a small

dock for launching invite you to paddle along the shoreline. Alternatively, hike around the lake or hang out by the **campfire**. **Snacks and water** are provided here. You will spend 60 - 90 minutes at the lake; then, hike back to the floating house to gather your personal belongings, drop off the gear, and **boat** back to Sitka.

Participants wishing to fish must purchase a license directly from the skipper (cash only). Terrain includes inclines and slippery surfaces. Participants must be in good physical shape and be prepared to hike for about 45 minutes each way to and from the lake. Minimum age is 7 years. Rubber boots, backpacks and fishing gear are provided. The **food truck** scene has made its way to Sitka, and you'll check out **Ashmo's** -- one of the best. Chef Ashley Moore specializes in wild Alaskan fish. The menu changes throughout the week, but one of the standouts is black cod tips served with rice.

Another culinary highlight is the local **clam chowder** sourced from area shellfish. You'll stop at an atmospheric Sitka restaurant and enjoy rich chowder -- the essence of Alaska in a bowl -- along with other local treats.

One of the finest places to experience Alaska's fascinating Russian heritage is here in Sitka -- the former capital of Russian America. You'll stop by a new local restaurant to sample **pelmeni** -- a dish at the heart of Russian cuisine. This light and delicious dumpling is wrapped in a thin dough and is just spicy enough that you know you're trying something different. Choose either the meat or potato variety -- you can't go wrong.

Another only-in-Sitka experience is a visit to the Alaska Pure Sea Salt Company. Here, you'll learn how founders Jim and Darcy Michener discovered that the surrounding crystal-clear waters produce perfectly flaked sea salt. They combined their passion for great food and wild places to create a product now used by some of the nation's top chefs. During your visit, you'll get to taste some locally-infused flavors, including Alder Smoked, Wild Blueberry and Sitka Spruce Tip.

No Alaska food experience is complete without sampling reindeer meat. In Sitka, you can try famous reindeer sausage hot dogs. You'll meet Chef Jo, who takes this experience to a whole new level with her creative twists on this local treat, such as a Mighty Mac n Cheese Dawg with white cheddar and smoky bacon bits. Or perhaps you would prefer the Hot Diggity Dawg with prosciutto, brie and caramelized onions. Whichever way you go, it's a flavor you won't forget and, with some creativity, you can replicate at home.

Tongass Rain Forest Nature Hike

From here, it is a half-mile level boardwalk through the Starrigavin Estuary bird viewing area. Cross the road and begin the 1.5-mile Mosquito Cove Loop Trail, gaining approximately 300 feet in elevation.

Walk along the beach back to Old Sitka and return to the pier.

Restrooms are available at the Starrigavin Estuary bird viewing area. The entire hike is potentially four miles long and is for those in moderate shape; however, each group sets its own hiking pace, so the length of the hike may vary between two and four miles. Viewing opportunities are facilitated by large wraparound windows and an expansive open-air deck, along with a special bow-landing door to allow easy beach access.

Wildlife plentiful here, and your skipper has a

profound knowledge of the preferred habitats and movement of whales, sea otters, sea lions, porpoises, seals, brown bears and bald eagles. He also knows the best places to explore and **photograph** awe-inspiring volcanic formations, glacier-carved peaks, secluded passages and other natural wonders. Weather permitting, you may circumnavigate the rugged coast of St Lazaria National Wildlife Refuge -- breeding grounds for thousands of seabirds, including puffins, auklets and murres.

Before you begin, gear up with state-of-theart equipment for this extreme adventure. Don an exposure suit, a balaclava, safety glasses and gloves. The ocean raft gets you out into nature quickly with a blast of fresh air. Specially designed straddle seats provide comfortable and secure seating for this exciting trip out into nature.

This thrill ride takes you offshore into ocean waters to explore the ravaged **volcanic coastline of Kruzof Island**. This area makes for excellent photographic opportunities and is home to a variety of wildlife. It is common to spot whales, sea otters, Steller sea lions and sea birds, brown (grizzly) bears and Sitka black-tail deer from the raft. You will get close to the towering cliffs of St Lazaria Island -- a National Wildlife Refuge -- where sea birds nest.

In a volcanic **sea cave** (weather permitting), the skipper will stop the boat and shut down the engine so you can listen to the surf crashing on the volcanic cliffs. You may be

lucky enough to hear the song of nesting seabirds or whales breathing.

Reboard your motorcoach and transfer to a beautiful **Alaskan restaurant**. As you take in the waterfront views, enjoy samples of local **microbrews**, and Alaska appetizers..

Not far away, the Fortress of the Bear

provides the opportunity to get within 25 feet of Alaska's distinctive brown bear in a setting that closely replicates the animal's natural habitat. This three-quarter-acre habitat, located about seven miles from the town center, lies adjacent to the Tongass National Forest. Stand on the large, covered viewing platform to observe the bears and appreciate their individual personalities. It's a titan on the move, advancing faster than almost any other glacier on the continent. When it reaches saltwater at Disenchantment Bay, the imposing architecture of this behemoth measures five miles in width and 40 stories in height, dwarfing even the largest ships. As you glide along this sparkling blue marvel, watch for seals basking on ice floes, listen for the loud, deep rumble and wait for the mighty crack and thunderous crash. At any moment, you could be witness to an eternal drama as nature's hand sculpts icebergs before your wondering eyes.

Excursions by Catamaran: Hubbard Glacier & Enchanting Disenchantment Bay

Board an Alaskan-built expedition vessel for stunning, unmatched perspective of Hubbard Glacier -- one of Alaska's most famous landmarks.

From the mouth of **Disenchantment Bay**, you will cruise in comfort amid shimmering icebergs and dramatic wilderness.

You will board a **day-boat** directly from the ship. Relax in the warm, comfortable cabin, surrounded by large windows, as the naturalist and crew orient you to the stunning scenery and prolific wildlife. You'll cruise near the rocky shoreline and weave through a maze of icebergs that have fallen from the face of the glacier -- the perspective from the smaller vessel is astounding.

Ice conditions permitting, the captain will navigate the narrow cut between Haenke Island and the mainland en route to Hubbard Glacier. Offering a variety of viewing angles for photos and video, this "river of ice" is often very active, calving icebergs with an

almighty crash. Unlike many other glaciers, **Hubbard Glacier** is advancing. At times, this advance has been up to 7 feet a day, earning it the nickname, 'the Galloping Glacier.'

Along the glacially-carved coastlines, an endless expanse of spruce and hemlock trees, snowcapped mountains, and glaciers are the subject of the naturalist's compelling narration. On a clear day, you may see Mount St Elias -- the second tallest peak in the United States.

Hot beverages are included; a selection of food is available for purchase (at your own expense).

Notes:

This tour departs directly from the cruise ship in a remote wilderness area. Little walking is required; however, participants must be able to walk across a narrow, moderately-steep gangway to (dis)embark the vessel with only minor assistance. Meet a local finisher of the Iditarod and **see** how to pan for gold with the help of a resident miner who will share stories of the Nome gold rush.

Mighty musk oxen roam freely on the tundra -- keep an eye out, and you might be lucky enough to spot a few.

End your tour at the **Carrie McLean Museum** to browse among the exhibits on the history, culture and geography of sub-arctic Alaska.

A courtesy shuttle will return you to the harbor or you can wander back on foot (approximately .75 mile).

Sluice Box Gold Mining Adventure (A Small-Group Tour)

There's gold in them that hills, and this time, it's for real. Join a local gold miner and a small group of just 16 privileged guests for an excursion to a placer mine about six miles from Nome.

You'll spend four hours working at a sluice box in a mining claim in a group of four. Enjoy a lot more help than the prospectors had in 1901, as local guides provide support and assistance throughout the process. They explain the steps and work with you to make sure you capture as much gold as you can. The first 1.5 hours are spent working your claim by shoveling paydirt into your sluice box, powered by a hydraulic pump. The remaining time is for clean-up.

You and your crew can **keep all the gold you find**. It's unlikely to make you independently wealthy, but the experience is richly rewarding.

A small **snack** is included.

Kodiak, Alaska, US - Tuesday, June 25, 2024: Kodiak Island has been home to the Alutiiq people for more than 7,500 years, but its most famous inhabitant is surely the enormous sub-species of grizzly known as the Kodiak brown bear. Some of these giants weigh 1500 pounds and stand ten feet tall. Apart from a larger-than-life animal kingdom, Kodiak also boasts legendary fishing, the noticeable influence of historic Russian America, and spotless green fjords.

A Walk through Kodiak Harbor

Departs: 7:30 AM (Waitlisted), 10:00 AM Approximately 1½ Hours Adult \$69.95; Child \$29.95

During this 90-minute **walking tour** along the waterfront of one of the largest fishing ports in the United States, you will step into the rough-and-ready world of Alaska's commercial fisheries.

A knowledgeable guide will lead you down Cannery Row to Kodiak Harbor, where you will encounter working commercial fishermen, boats and fishing gear. Along the way, you will hear life-and-death stories of Kodiak's commercial fishing fleet and, if fishermen are on the docks as you pass by, have a chat with them as they prepare their gear and boats for another commercial fishing trip. Learn about the different kinds of fishing vessels in Alaska and view crab pots, nets and hooks used to catch the crabs and fish off Alaska's coast. Observe the human activity on the docks and keep an eye out for bald eagles, harbor seals and Steller sea lions, which often frequent the harbor.

You'll also hear about the Great Alaska Earthquake and tsunami of 1964 that destroyed much of the town of Kodiak and its fishing fleet.

End your walk at the Harbormaster Building

in **downtown Kodiak** where, if you wish, you can leave the tour and spend some time exploring or **shopping** on your own.

Notes:

This walking tour begins at your ship and ends at the small boat harbor in downtown Kodiak. Participants must be able to walk for 90 minutes and be physically fit. This tour is entirely on foot and covers about 1.5 miles over city streets and on harbor floats. Some parts of the tour cross unpaved surfaces. Breathtaking views and magnificent fishing are the order of the day as up to four guests enjoy five hours of **saltwater fishing** in Kodiak. This island is home to the famous Kodiak brown bear sub-species as well as marine wildlife, including humpback, fin and minke whales, and occasionally, orca whales.

Meet your crew at St Paul Harbor and climb aboard a custom 28-foot Peregrine landing craft. Outfitted with 20-foot-long pontoons on either side, this stable vessel is your platform for targeting **Pacific halibut, king salmon, and rockfish**.

The fishing grounds are generally 30 minutes away. Bait, tackle, rods, and reels for the day are included, along with light **snacks** such as fruit, muffins and water.

Back at the harbor, if you want to keep your catch, a separate fee is charged for the crew to professionally filet your catch and ship it from Kodiak to your destination of choice. It is vacuum-packed and flash-frozen for transportation.

Notes:

A light snack is provided. Minimum age is 5 years. Dress warmly in layers with a wind-and waterproof outer layer; bring gloves, a scarf and a warm hat. Guests who choose to have their fish processed and sent home (to the US only) must bring a credit card to pay for processing. A catch is likely but is not guaranteed. From here, you'll set out on a leisurely 9.5-mile guided bike ride along Anchorage's famous Tony Knowles Coastal Trail. There are plenty of opportunities for photos along the way as this bike ride along the coast offers views of five different mountain ranges. Homer, Alaska, US - Friday, June 28, 2024: On southern Kenai Peninsula, Homer is located on the pristine waters of Kachemak Bay and Cook Inlet, in the shadow of the Kenai Mountains. The second largest city on the peninsula, Homer boasts the geographical anomaly that locals call "The Spit." 15,000 years ago, a glacier covering Kachemak Bay pushed a five-mile long gravel bar toward Cook Inlet. Pass through Fort Seward -- the last of a series

of military posts established in Alaska during the gold rush era, now housing art galleries, restaurants, and a center for Native arts.

Picture Point offers a dazzling panorama of majestic snow-capped mountains.

Since 1996, the American Bald Eagle
Foundation has been dedicated to the
protection and preservation of the bald eagle's
habitat through its educational and research
activities. Come face to face with eagles,
falcons and other birds of prey. Meet one of
the handlers, who will offer an overview of
North American raptors such as bald eagles,
owls, hawks and falcons. Learn how their
excellent eyesight, sharp talons, and hooked
beaks characterize raptors and how Alaska's
flyways and skyways help the birds migrate.

One of these noble creatures will swoop and soar during a **live flight demonstration**; you'll also see how they dine in captivity.

Browse in the **gift shop** before a scenic drive back to Haines.

Two important rivers, the Chilkat and Chilkoot, meet the sea here at Haines. Along with a series of mountain ranges, these two rivers flank the town, whose population is just 2,500 residents. This 2.25-hour small-group tour (14 guests maximum) provides a chance to get to know both rivers.

Begin with a short **panoramic drive** through historic Fort Seward en route to the Pyramid Island Lookout. This wide delta is where the braided **Chilkat River** drops tons of glacial silt into the ocean every day. Continue along the water's edge to the **Letnikof Cove Cannery Lookout**. Here, Rainbow Glacier and the Chilkat Mountains provide a dazzling backdrop to the red buildings of this historic salmon cannery.

Retrace the route back to downtown Haines and travel to the mouth of the **Chilkoot River**.

The road winds along the seafront. Keep your eyes open for bird and marine mammal sightings.

Where the Chilkoot River flows into the sea, all things Alaskan come together -- delta, ocean, mountains and forest -- the stuff of gorgeous postcards. Bald eagles are often spotted here, calling to each other as they soar above the spruce trees.

Return to Haines with a final stop at **Picture Point** to photograph your ship with the iconic white buildings of Historic Fort Seward in the foreground and the gleaming Chilkat Mountains as a backdrop.

Naturalist guides share their knowledge of this incredible land and the abundant wildlife that lives here -- eagles, moose, bears and even wolves.

Step ashore for a **picnic lunch** complete with beverages and cookies.

Welcome to the Native village of **Klukwan**, nestled on the riverbank. Visit the **Jilkaat Kwaan Heritage Center** -- a state-of-the-art, museum-quality center that houses an array of Tlingit cultural treasures and masterworks of Northwest Coast Indian art in the Whale

House Collection. It's believed that

Kaajísdu.axtch -- a Tlingit master artist -- created this much-coveted collection of carvings more than 200 years ago.

Stroll to the village's traditional cultural camp and watch craft and storytelling demonstrations. Purchase handmade souvenirs if you wish.

Listen to a **bicycle** orientation and safety briefing and begin your **ride** along the shoreline of the inlet. You'll pedal nine miles along a flat, paved road, keeping an eye out for wildlife such as eagles, salmon, porpoises, sea lions, whales and bears. Where the river

meets the sea, salmon school up for their cyclical journey to their spawning grounds.

Snap photos of the breathtaking views across the emerald lake and inlet surrounded by glaciers, waterfalls and jagged mountain peaks. You may even spot a bear feeding on salmon.

Your tour concludes with a relaxing drive back to the pier.

Back on your bike, you'll continue to the **Haines Brewing Company** -- a state-of-theart brewery on Main Street in the heart of Haines. **Sample locally brewed beers**, root beer, or tea.

The vessel is specially designed for navigating this silt-laden river, which is the only access to this remote, roadless portion of the preserve. No other tour ventures into this same territory. The boats are not enclosed, allowing you to view and photograph the majestic scenery and wildlife in an unhindered fashion.

Eagles, moose, and bears are quite often the highlight of the river tour, making for wonderful photo opportunities. The scenery alone is worth the trip, with cascading, hanging glaciers and surrounding mountains that soar to 6,000-foot peaks -- this is the real,

untouched beauty of the Alaska you came to see.

Back on land, spend time with the captain, crew and staff, enjoying **beverages** in a covered and heated pavilion or around a crackling campfire.

times -- early in the morning or later in the afternoon -- are timed to maximize wildlife viewing and take advantage of low-angle light for the best photographs.

Bald eagles are commonly seen and, depending on the time of year, brown bear often feed on salmon along the Chilkoot River. The small-group nature of this outing allows the guide to spend time with each guest, making the most of your photo experience.

Meet your guide on the pier and walk two blocks uphill through the historical Quartermaster District of Fort William H. Seward, built in 1902. Learn the history of the distillery, its context within the community of Haines, and the owners' journey of renovating and establishing the facility. Visit the production building and barrel hall to try a tour-exclusive sample of Wrackline rye

whiskey straight from the barrel.

Dive deeper into the Haines experience with a sensory exploration and tasting of the distillery's six **handcrafted Brightwork Bitters**. These herbal and floral tinctures incorporate plants of Alaska that you will see, smell, and taste. Learn how these are added to spirits to put the finishing touches on a cocktail.

In the Tasting Room, enjoy the craft spirits in tasting flights or handcrafted cocktails made with fresh syrups and juices. Ask questions and shop for bottles to take home.

Walk back to the ship with your guide. Guests wishing to stay in town to shop or explore independently are welcome to do so but must make their own way back to the ship.

Wander with your guide through his 60-acre park, learning about the animals that live here and how they thrive in this protected habitat, retaining their independence while learning to trust humans. This home for numerous orphaned wild animals includes a Kodiak bear, wolf, Arctic fox, lynx, porcupine, pine marten, mink, reindeer and wolverines. Unsuited to release back into the wild, they will live out the rest of their natural lives here with their friend and caregiver. Observe the behaviors of these intriguing animals to understand and appreciate the time it takes to gain their trust.

With the preserve and Kroschel Wildlife Park behind you, you leave with a myriad of memories and photographs.

Explore historic Fort Seward in the picturesque village of Haines before starting the 22-mile drive up the Chilkat Valley to Klukwan, passing through the **Chilkat Bald Eagle Preserve**.

Located at the confluence of three rivers, ancient yet contemporary **Klukwan** has seen a multitude of generations. For hundreds of years, the Tlingit people have lived off the bounty of this special place; their close relationship to the land is revealed through the exhibits in their Heritage Center. The newly-opened, state-of-the-art, museum-quality center is situated on the northern banks of the Chilkat River and provides access to the Whale House collection. Displayed in its place of origin, this collection allows entrance to Chilkat's distinctive ethnic landscape and an appreciation of the depth and complexity of Tlingit society.

Watch a Tlingit drumming and dance presentation and enjoy some locally-caught smoked salmon. Browse in the gift shop for native arts and crafts or watch bald eagles fishing for salmon in the Chilkat River.

There may be some restrictions on photos and video during the visit to Klukwan. Tour sequence may vary. Participants must be able to walk comfortably over a variety of surfaces without assistance. The mules are equipped with seat belts for up to five guests, are easily accessible and have storage for extra supplies and equipment. The excitement begins as you turn the key.

Watch for bears at your first stop as you enjoy a snack of fresh-baked cookies and hot chocolate at the lodge. As you venture on,

take advantage of the magnificent photo opportunities, including crystal-clear mountain streams, a cascading waterfall, a scenic alpine lake, and hopefully, the occasional eagle or bear.

At the sub-alpine meadow, you will encounter a panoramic view of Lynn Canal, Chilkoot Lake and the many snow-capped mountains that make Alaska so famous.

On the way down, stop once again at the exclusive mountaintop lodge to enjoy a warm fire, stunning views and a home-cooked halibut and chicken **lunch** made just for you.

After you've relaxed by the fire, make your way back down to the trailhead to climb aboard the Takshanuk Trail bus. Enjoy a short tour of Historic Haines and Fort William H. Seward as you return to the ship.

White Pass Summit Scenic Railway in Skagway

Board a high-speed catamaran for a scenic **45-minute cruise along North America's longest and deepest fjord**, past waterfalls and ice-sculpted peaks, to Skagway.

Today's 40-mile round-trip adventure on the historic, narrow-gauge White Pass & Yukon Route Railroad is an unforgettable way to see this area. Built during the Klondike Gold Rush, this engineering wonder is an International Historic Civil Engineering Landmark -- an honor shared with the Eiffel Tower, the Panama Canal and the Statue of Liberty. The 110-mile railroad was officially completed in 1900. Restored cars pulled by vintage diesel locomotives climb nearly 3,000 feet over 20 miles of steep grades and cliffhanging turns. Watch for Bridal Veil Falls, Inspiration Point and Dead Horse Gulch, mountains, glaciers, gorges, waterfalls, tunnels, trestles, and historic sites.

A **meal** is included on this full-day tour. If time allows between the train trip and the ferry ride, you may have some free time to shop and explore downtown Skagway before you return to Haines via fast ferry.

Roberts Tramway for a great spot to hike and shoot a souvenir photo.

Beer, wine and soda are available for purchase.

Stroll through the woods and **roast** marshmallows over the campfire after your meal.

Take the short **walk** along Salmon Creek -- a salmon spawning stream -- to a waterfall where you can also explore the remains of the historic Wagner Mine and try your hand at **gold panning**. Shuttle buses run regularly; return to the pier at your leisure.

This specialized watercraft has large, opening panel windows and an open bow and stern for viewing the wildlife that thrives in these protected waters. Humpback whales, orcas, sea lions, porpoises, seals and sea birds are commonly seen. Stephens Passage is a renowned whale watching and wildlife refuge, and your experienced Coast Guard-certified captain will guide you to the action. Keep your camera handy as you travel from place to place or drift quietly to witness the behaviors and antics of the area's notable marine residents. This tour is locally owned and operated.

The operator of this tour guarantees that a

whale will be sighted on this excursion from May 15th through September 15th, with participants receiving a \$100 cash refund from the tour operator after the tour if a whale is not sighted. Explore the **Mendenhall Wetlands**, where you can view the spectacular Mendenhall Glacier from an ocean explorer's point of view. This view of the glacier is from about six miles away, so (weather/cloud conditions permitting) you'll see how the massive river of ice winds up through the mountain peaks for miles -- truly one of the best views of Mendenhall Glacier.

Along the way, your guide will entertain you with stories about Smugglers Cove and the surrounding area's history and point out any local flora and fauna. This kayak trip is perfect for all levels of experience -- participants are grouped into like abilities so that you can travel at a comfortable pace. A guide will explain why this process was unique among the different kinds of mining used in Alaska. After a brief demonstration, you can pan for gold and garnets from the tailings of the mine. Pay dirt is guaranteed and you can keep what you find. Wander among displays and the ruins. View the first locomotive to come to Alaska for mining. Visit the gift shop and museum before you return to town.

Arriving at the lake, gear up, board a **raft**, and take off on an unforgettable adventure where you can get out into nature, learn about the area, and see the glacier, icebergs and some wildlife.

Your experienced guide will steer you across the serene waters of the lake, maneuvering past floating icebergs to the river beyond. The speed of the water and level of the rapids vary depending on the weather. You will be **rafting a five-mile stretch of river** from Mendenhall Lake in the Tongass National Forest downstream towards Juneau Harbor.

Your guide explains the natural phenomena at work in this scenic valley. Marvel at the spectacular glacier views and towering peaks as you float downstream. Watch for the local wildlife, which may include -- arctic terns, eagles, goats, salmon, otters, bears and more.

Back ashore, you'll enjoy a **snack** with a warm beverage and, if you wish, purchase a photo of your rafting experience before reboarding your motorcoach for the short ride back to your ship.

Notes:

Tour is mainly a scenic experience with a short section of rapids where the guide takes complete charge of the raft. Guests interested in a higher level of activity, following the guide's commands and powering the raft through the troughs of the rapids (one mile of Class III rapids), should ask to be seated in a paddle raft. Beverages are available for purchase. With a marshmallow-roasting fire pit, majestic waterfall, mining relics and a totem carver on site, there's something for everyone -- a great way to end this one-of-a-kind adventure.

Your captain can arrange for any fish you catch to be professionally processed locally (flashfrozen) and shipped to your home for an additional charge.

You'll come within arm's length of the ice and gain an understanding of the immense size of the glacier from the level of the river. The airboat captain will stop the boat in various locations for incredible photos and talk about the glacier and the river basin it has carved over the years.

Back at Taku Point, you'll leave the airboat to rejoin the helicopter that will take you up to **the top of Taku Glacier for a glacier landing**. Step out of the helicopter and set foot on the 4,500-foot-thick ice. You'll have time for more photos, and your pilot will give you details about the Ice Field and facts specific to the Taku Glacier.

The helicopter will return you to the heliport in Juneau with a van transfer back to the pier.

The **Machinery Stories** show visitors how ore material was pulled from the ground, processed, and moved by stamp mills and trains.

Once whales have been sighted, your skipper will gently maneuver the vessel to allow exceptional viewing and photo opportunities as these graceful ocean giants slowly arc their massive tail flukes into the air. The whales are often close enough to hear them breathe. An **onboard naturalist** will explain the behavior and habitat of the humpback whale and other wildlife you may encounter, including killer whales, Steller sea lions, Dall's porpoise, harbor seals, bald eagles and Sitka black-tail deer.

Here, the trail levels off, and a boardwalk across a marshy area is open to the sky. From the east side of **Mt Oldfield**, take in the view of Morse Basin and the Coast Mountains in the distance.

Take a 20-minute break for an energy-rich, locally-made **snack and sandwich**. Questions? This is the time to ask them, and your guide will answer them.

Trekking back along the same path, descend to the base of Mt Oldfield and return to Prince Rupert.
